### **OPFMA GOES ON THE ROAD**

With HB 251 legislation on the horizon, our Education Committee Chairman Ted Howell and OPFMA President Constantin Draganoiu have been out there promoting OPFMA's mission and the Building Operator Certification (BOC) program through out Ohio.

#### Section 123.011. (D)(6) of the proposed legislation - HB251 - as currently written, states:

..... not later than two years after the effective date of this amendment, each state-funded facility excepting a facility of a state institution of higher education is managed by at least one building operator certified under the building operator certification program or any equivalent program.

Most state-funded facilities are unaware of the proposed legislation so we have taken on the task of spreading the word. So far we have presented it to the Buckeye Association for School Administrators (BASA), the Ohio Association of School Business Officials (OASBO), the County Commissioners' Association of Ohio (CCAO), State Facilities Management Round Table and Dayton Trane School Facilities Seminar. Another presentation will be held at OSBA Capital Conference on Nov 13 by Sherry Hubbard Manager of the Energy Outreach OEE/ODOD, Ted Howell Senior Project Engineer with The Brewer-Garrett Co., Karel B. Oxley Lima City Schools Superintendent and Mark Wantage Maintenance Administrator with the Ohio School Facilities Commission.

On Nov 14<sup>th</sup> we will have a table in the "Avenue of Answers" a three hours session presented by Norm Sorge, Maintenance Supervisor Medina City Schools, Randy Crossley Supervisor of Plant Operations of Lima City Schools and Ted Howell. Norm and Randy are also BOC graduates and Ted is a BOC Instructor! Talking from experience!

Included in the "state-funded" facilities there are 614 school districts in Ohio. With the energy conservation training requirement of HB 251 we should be very busy for the next few years! ### <u>Changes Create New Fuel Challenges –</u> <u>Are You Prepared?</u>

As the energy and cost efficiency matters are a priority on every public facility's maintenance department agenda, OPFMA brings in experts in the fuel efficiency field to assist and prepare you for tomorrow's challenges! "Clean Air Act & Fleet Emission" and "Fleet Efficiency" – are two of the 2006 Conference's sessions. Plan to be there – ask questions and learn from the experts!

#### Richard Greenwald OPFMA Associate Member presents below some information on the EPA mandate for use of diesel fuel.

Soon there will be new sulfur content requirements for diesel fuel – it will be reduced from 500 ppm to 15 ppm. The new law will create a re-run of the era when many challenges were created by unleaded fuel as it took over the market. Prepare yourself as we are heading fast toward similar crisis and challenges with the diesel engines!

Due to the health and environmental concerns, the EPA has mandated that all diesel fuels will eventually become more environmentally friendly by reducing the sulfur content in the fuel. The reduction of sulfur in today's diesel fuel will cause a great deal of harm to all engines, pumps, and injectors, if not treated with a good fuel additive. Most school systems and city governments rely on their fuel supplier to provide a good quality fuel at a reasonable cost. The large majority of fuel suppliers will be surprised by the intricate effect that the up-coming ultra-low sulfur diesel fuel will have on the existing operations! In a recent meeting with lubrication specialists from all over the US, it was revealed that most suppliers have adopted *"the wait and see"* attitude! They are used to the price-driven fuel market, and don't realize that the blending of fuels - will not be allowed anymore. Some don't realize that the premium fuel they have been purchasing will not be produced in the near future!

The new law requirements create lots of changes that we must face and handle to provide a smooth transition. Prevention is better than repairing! The ramifications created by the new law are many, and a whole seminar could be done to cover all of them, and we should have one!

Here is a list with the most evident ones to start preparing you to meet the challenges down the road.

\* Some busses will need to be updated with soot traps, modified fuel pumps, catalytic converters, and other emission control equipment. Once modified, the engine will no longer be able to use fuel with more than 15 ppm sulfur. Most of the modifications will reduce the efficiency of the engine by approximately 4%.

\* The availability of the ultra low product could be sparse at times, while over-the-road premium and low sulfur fuels will be discontinued,

\* The product may not be stored in containers or tanks that had contained other diesel fuels until flushed several times to reduce the sulfur content to 15 ppm,

\* Storage in plastic tanks may increase the sulfur content of the fuel,

\* Some newer equipment will have sensors that will prohibit the equipment from operating if the sulfur content is above 15 ppm,

\* The elimination of most of the sulfur from the diesel also reduces the lubricity of the fuel. Lubricity is essential to the proper operation of injectors, rings and fuel pumps.

A well informed supplier should be educating his customers that with the proper fuel treatment program, most fuel users' consumption will go down an average of 5% as well as he shall give them the new guidelines to follow when selecting a diesel fuel additive to make the transition smoother.
